The theme for Catholic Schools Week 2026 is  
**Catholic Schools: Normal Lives, Called to Holiness.**

We all have dreams and hopes in life. For some, this might be playing football or hurling for your county someday, becoming a famous singer or becoming a doctor or an astronaut when you grow up. ### The daily themes are as follows:

Monday	Called to Holiness through Prayer
Tuesday	Called to Holiness through Love and Friendship
Wednesday	Called to Holiness in Family Life (Grandparents' Day)
Thursday	Called to Holiness through Courage and Service
Friday	Called to Holiness through Joy and Mission

As in previous years, the daily themes contain resources for the class groupings: Junior and Senior Infants/Primary 1 and 2; First and Second Class/Primary 3 and 4; Third and Fourth Class/Primary 5 and 6; and Fifth and Sixth Class/Primary 7.

The relevant strands and strand units of the *Catholic Pre-School and Primary Religious Education Curriculum for Ireland (2015)* are also listed for each class grouping at the beginning of the lesson plans.

On Wednesday, we celebrate **Grandparents' Day**. On that day, we offer some suggestions for class activities. Schools are encouraged to celebrate this day in a manner they deem most appropriate and manageable in accordance with their own local circumstances, such as with an in-person Mass for grandparents. A prayer service for use in the school or classroom is also available, as well as suggestions for parish celebrations.
